


The Why

2. Black History Month

Important Things to Consider

Find out what's on their minds and how they are making sense of our society's growing diversity. Then use their words and points of view to anchor lessons. Student voice roots lessons in relevance.

Student Experience Complete History

Explore more than the struggles and traumas Black people faced in our country's history. Teach beyond slavery. Celebrate Black civil engagement, moments of liberation, and use Black literature. Reiterate that Black History is American History and is worthy of learning all year long.

Dig Deeper

As students learn and discuss important Black History figures, teach them more than one perspective. For example, Dr. King was committed to the Civil Rights movement, but he fought hard for other social initiatives. too.


